Message from the URWC President

Alison Hayford

University of Regina Women has encountered some changes and challenges in the past year, and we need to think about our future and purpose. URWomen started out as a service organization, focused on helping wives of new faculty—few women were hired as faculty before the 1980s—adjust to Regina and to life as adjuncts of the University. Over time, membership broadened beyond faculty wives and the focus of the group shifted to social events. The main activities of URWomen in recent years have involved the various interest groups and two or three URWomen events in each year. The interest groups remain strong and 2016-17 saw the establishment of some new groups: a third book club, a cinema group, a cercle francais. The fall welcome back reception was well attended and as usual, URWomen served at the Fall Convocation reception and will serve again in June. But some problems have also arisen. For a number of years URWomen has shared a fall event with the Canadian Federation of University Women, with each group taking charge of organizing an event in alternate years. In the fall of 2016, CFUW decided to disband. While URWomen offered membership to CFUW members, none took us up on the offer. URWomen membership has remained fairly stable over several years, and we have been happy that several younger faculty and staff from

the University have joined the group. But stability also means that the group's membership is static, and only about half of what it was in earlier times. While the new interest groups have created a space for new members to participate, and some have been organized at times that better suit the needs of people still in the labour force, the fact remains that much of the membership consists of older women. Static membership numbers have some real consequences; for example, over the past few years, despite the generosity of our members we have not received enough donations to fully fund the URWomen bursary we award to an undergraduate woman each year. It is also true that the circumstances that shaped the creation of URWomen over 50 years ago are no longer the circumstances of women associated with the University today, which indicates that it is important to think about the group's purposes. Over the past few months, the URWomen Executive has discussed general issues around the purpose of the organization and its potential for rejuvenation. We plan to bring some specific issues and proposals to the membership for discussion. One question is whether the group should shift, at least in part, from a focus on social groups and events to some kind of broader service to the University and/or to the larger community. I will welcome any comments and suggestions from members about how URWomen should move forward.

Membership

As of March 2017, our membership consists of 56 paid members and three honorary members.

The fees are used to offset the cost of events, pay for materials, and add to the bursary if necessary.

University of Regina Women – Bursaries and Awards

The honoree for the **2016 bursary** was **Dr. Joan Roy**. She was a former high school teacher in Montreal and a Clinical Psychologist for school boards in Ontario and Manitoba before taking ten years off to be a full-time mom while maintaining a limited private practice. She joined the Psychology Department at the University of Regina in 1988, from which she retired in 2001. Joan has been an active member of U of R Women since her retirement and has held several positions on the executive including that of president in 2004 and 2005. Joan asked that the 2016 bursary be granted to a second-year female student in Psychology (Arts). That person was **Berkley Peterson**.

The honoree for the **2017 bursary** is **Samira** (**Samy**) **McCarthy**. She was Professor of English at Campion College, University of Regina, for 41 years, from 1968 until her retirement in 2009. Aside from teaching, she also served in administration at Campion, as Assistant Dean from 1995-2001, and Academic Dean from 2002-2009. Prior to joining the Campion faculty, she taught in secondary schools in the Philippines, in New York city, and in Regina, for a total of 5 years.

Born in the Philippines, she completed her undergraduate degrees at the Ateneo de Davao, a Jesuit college in her home town, and her graduate work at Fordham University in New York city. She has lived in Regina since 1966, and travels frequently to visit her 3 children and 7 grandchildren, in Montreal and in Sydney, N.S. She joined the Faculty Wives organization in 1966, as the UofR Women was then called, but ceased to be an active member after three years, as teaching and motherhood took most of her time. She rejoined as an active member in 2009, and now serves on the Executive of the organization.

It is not surprising that she has selected English as the discipline for the 2017 U of R Women's Bursary, as it is the study of literature for which she has been most passionate all her life. As per university policy, the bursary went to an undergraduate student with a minimum of 53 credit hours (2 years) completed.
