We are now accepting applications for project proposals and looking forward to building partnerships with interested organizations in Yorkton and area communities throughout the summer.



YORKTON & AREA LOCATION SELECTED


Yorkton and its surrounding region has been chosen as the area of focus for organizations to deliver services that support greater social inclusion of older adults living with dementia and their care partners.
